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WOODBINE RECEIVES BIDS FOR TWO ROADWAY RECONSTRUCTION PROJECTS

Woodbine—Mayor William Pikolycky is pleased to announce that the Borough of Woodbine received bids for two roadway reconstruction projects on April 23, 2009.

The first, for the reconstruction of portions of Franklin Street between Washington and Adams Avenues, including roadway reconstruction, concrete sidewalks, and concrete gutters received 10 bids:

Albrecht and Heun, Cape May Court House, \$32,550; Asphalt Paving Corp., Malaga, \$38,449; Asphalt Paving Systems, Inc., Hammonton, \$49,870; Infrastructure, L.L.C., Galloway, \$48,750; Jerry & Sons Excavating, Inc., Mays Landing, \$33,505; Jonathan Hand Excavating, Inc., Cape May Court House, \$45,495; Krisanna Construction, Hammonton, \$52,135; Ricky Slade Construction, Inc., Bridgeton, \$29,240; SMB Paving, L.L.C., Deptford, \$44,435; South State, L.L.C., Bridgeton, \$47,545.

This project is being funded under a \$46,000 grant from the New Jersey Department of Transportation's Transportation Trust Fund.

The second, for reconstruction of the entrance road to the Woodbine Municipal Airport (Henry DeCinque Boulevard), including roadway reconstruction, concrete curbs, and drainage work received 11 bids:

Albrecht and Heun, Cape May Court House, \$185,730; Asphalt Paving Systems, Inc., Hammonton, \$213,499.40; Infrastructure, L.L.C., Galloway, \$217,250; Jerry & Sons Excavating, Inc., Mays Landing, \$185,233; Jonathan Hand Excavating, Inc., Cape May Court House, \$188,193; K.E. Seifret, Inc., Langhorne, PA, \$241,189; Krisanna Construction, Hammonton, \$225,920; Ricky Slade Construction, Inc., Bridgeton, \$191,417; SMB Paving, L.L.C., Deptford, \$179,433; South State, L.L.C., Bridgeton, \$195,420; WECO Construction Co., Inc., Egg Harbor Township, \$261,497.

This project is also being funded under a New Jersey Department of Transportation's Transportation Trust Fund grant in the amount of \$225,000.

Contracts are expected to be awarded at Borough Council's May 7 meeting.

"There was a huge turnout in the number of contractors who responded," added Mayor Pikolycky. "which resulted in a more competitive bidding process, enabling the Borough to do more work for the money budgeted."
